Academics: A Year of Impact and Innovation

As some of you may know, I have been in the academic space for quite some time now. Over the past two years, I affiliated have been with four prestigious academic institutions. I am a Research Fellow at the Wits Centre for my PhD Journalism, alma mater (University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa), which a special place in my heart. holds Witwatersrand is one of Africa's top universities, and I am incredibly proud to be associated with it. Additionally, I serve as an Affiliate Faculty member at the Carter School of Peace and Conflict

Resolution at George Mason University, where I supervise a PhD student researching peace and social media in Kenya. I have also been an adjunct fellow at Strathmore University's Institute for Public Policy and Governance and a faculty member at another local University in Kenya, where I have played a key role in establishing the Media and Communication program.

I mention this background not to boast, but to provide context and address any doubts about my qualifications and the breadth of my experience. These affiliations reflect my commitment to academia and my dedication to fostering meaningful research and mentorship. At the same time, for personal reasons, I have been exploring opportunities to transition from traditional academic roles to industry and research-focused positions—a space that has always been my first love.

PUBLICATIONS AND RESEARCH

This year, I further solidified my research profile with several significant publications. Over the course of the year, I authored or coauthored a total of eight peerreviewed journal articles and book chapters, alongside two policy briefs and impactful blog pieces.

have focused These works on diverse yet interconnected areas, including citizen journalism, media ownership in Africa, digital inclusion. and ethical governance. Notably, after receiving a major grant last year from the Social Science Research Council on the role of AI in society, I continued explore this critical examining its implications for crime control, peacebuilding, and societal transformation.

My ongoing interest in Al's societal role led to invitations to speak at prominent conferences, including the Peace and Development Research Conference in Machakos and the African Studies Annual Meeting in Chicago. Among my works, the most intriguing has been my blog article on the Gen Z movement in Kenya, which was translated into several languages and has amassed over 34,000 reads to date, alongside hundreds of shares and republications.

Seeing the reach and impact of this piece makes me immensely proud, as it not only highlights the power of digital activism but also underscores the global interest in Kenyan youth movements.

Many people have, of course, asked me how I managed to have all these publications. The truth is, some of these works were old manuscripts from previous years that all reached publication stages this year.

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

Abstract

In an evolving media landscape, the prominence and influence of citizen journalism has




positive impact while safeguarding civil liberties and privacy.

Integrating Al into Kenya's crime control and public order management presents

significant opportunities and challenges. Currently, Al's role in these sectors primar-ily revolves around data analytics, predictive policing, and cybercrime⁴ and surveil-lance⁵, aiming to enhance efficiency in crime detection and resource allocation.

Balancing technological benefits with ethical considerations and civil liberties poses a central challenge, with concerns such as privacy infringement and algorithmic bi-ases at the forefront. Despite these challenges, AI offers promising opportunities

for more efficient law enforcement, conflict resolution,7 and enhanced public safety.




Additionally, I have received numerous invitations to publish—some of which I have accepted, while others I have had to decline to maintain focus and balance. This confluence of factors has made 2024 an extraordinary year for my scholarly output. Through these accomplishments, I have felt deeply inspired to continue bridging the gap between academic research and societal impact.

Looking onto 2025, I already have a number of publications lined up that I am truly excited about. Together with my friend,
Associate Professor Prinola Govenden from the University of Johannesburg, we are coediting a special issue on Decolonizing the Internet in Africa, which will be published by Communicatio. Additionally, I am collaborating with Professor Admire Mare, also from the University of Johannesburg, on a book project focused on digital activism in Africa. Beyond these, I have a book chapters and a journal articles scheduled for release early in the year.



Jane Frances Njoki Angalia 1966 - 2024

Despite the many wins of 2024, the year was overshadowed by a deeply personal and heartbreaking loss: the passing of Jane Frances Njoki. I met Jane Frances in 2004 during my undergraduate years when she served as the Public Relations Officer at our university. Our paths first crossed when I was the Editor of the Student Union and spearheading the university's first-ever student magazine. Jane became a mentor and a steadfast supporter, but more than that, she became like a mother to me. At the time, I was pursuing a Bachelor's degree in English and Literature, and her encouragement inspired me to later pursue postgraduate studies in Communication and Journalism and eventually a PhD in Media Studies. Interestingly, she had walked a similar academic path, holding a BA in English Literature and an MA in Communication from Daystar University. Over nearly two decades, our bond grew stronger, built on mutual respect, shared passions, and her unwavering belief in me.

The last ten years of her life were marked by an incredibly brave battle with breast cancer. Her illness significantly disrupted her pursuit of a PhD at JKUAT and stalled her career progression, yet she never allowed these challenges to dim her spirit. Jane often referred to me as her "only son." While she didn't have children of her own, she was surrounded by an extended family of friends and countless individuals whose lives she touched through her philanthropy. Even in her sickness, she continued to serve others with grace and generosity. Reflecting on her life fills me with gratitude for the lessons she imparted, and her memory will forever be a guiding light.

Jane Frances' absence is a void that words cannot adequately capture, and I will miss her profoundly.
